Time Line

- 1990 Kyrgyz Communist Party leadership opposes change to the Soviet constitution which allows non-Communist parties to take part in political life; state of emergency imposed after several hundred people are killed in interethnic clashes between Uzbeks and Kyrgyz over access to land and housing around the town of Osh, near border with Uzbekistan; Askar Akayev elected to the newly created post of president, later wins 'first democratic election'.
- 2000 Askar Akayev re-elected for his third term.
- 2005 Akayev's son and daughter are elected to the Parliament dominated by one party. Demonstrators seize official buildings. Akayev and his family flee to Russia. Capital city of Bishkek heavily looted. Kurmanbek Bakiyev is appointed as an acting president, later wins 'first democratic election'.
- 2010 Opposition protests spread from northern Kyrgyzstan to capital Bishkek. President Kurmanbek Bakiyev flees to Belarus. 87 protesters are shot at the main square of Bishkek. Foreign Minister Roza Otunbayeva appointed a president. June More than 400 people are killed in clashes between Kyrgyz and Uzbek ethnic communities in the southern cities of Osh and Jalalabad. Hundreds of thousands of people flee their homes. More than 90% of voters in a 'first democratic' referendum approve a new constitution reducing the powers of the presidency and turning Kyrgyzstan into a parliamentary republic.
